Remembering after 50 years this month.... The First Club Meeting of the Madison County R/C Flyers by Member Jon Fish, concept by Joe Bays

I got a call from Joe Bays a couple of days ago asking me if I could write something about the first meeting of Madison County R/C Flyers which was 50 years ago. Asking quite a lot Joe, since I was only 12 years old at the time and had (and still have) the attention span of a goldfish. So will do my best to recollect what went on. My dad Dick Fish took me to that first meeting. The reason I think was Mom's insistence to dad to get me out of the house that she had enough of my antics for one day. The meeting was at Jim Mahoney's house in Anderson. He was living near Athletic Park at the time. The guys met in Jim's kitchen and dad told me to sit in a chair in the corner of the kitchen and to keep my mouth shut. I think Jim's wife felt kind of sorry for me and gave me a couple of cookies and some lemonade. Not a bad trade off for not having to do anything. Now the scene I will try to depict will be that of a painting showing the framers of the constitution at one of their early meetings. There was a lot of cigarette smoke, coffee cups clanking, and what I thought at the time was a bunch of "old" guys talking about model airplanes "of all things".

I can't remember what all was discussed at that meeting, but perhaps the club's name or a flying site or both was discussed. I am sure there those who would remember. I'm sure I will be corrected if wrong but some of guys there was Don Huffman, Manual Cantrell, Marvin Leazenby, Norm Peters, Dick Brenner, my dad, and others I cannot remember. After that meeting Jim took us to his garage to show us his latest project. The garage seemed a dark and foreboding place to a 12 year old. But once there I marveled at all the planes sitting around. A couple of early R/C types and some control line models. There was also the smell of balsa, Testers wood glue, and Sig dope. Some smells you just don't forget. There were a few more meetings at Jim's Kitchen then they were moved to Don Huffman's basement in Elwood for couple of years until we out grew that venue and moved to the conference room at the Anderson Airport.

R/C Flyers 'swarm' to new home field

A new sound is coming from the northern part of Madison County...like a huge swarm of bees or a bunch of overgrown mosquitoes.

Neither pesky bugs is the culprit, however. The new sounds are being made by the Madison County R/C Flyers, a club that flies radiocontrolled aircraft. And, they hold their noise levels below 98 decibels, which is more than you can say about this year's mosquitoes.

The club is not new to the county, but its location is. The club flew out of Frankton for 30 years. The owner of the Frankton property died last December, leaving the club searching for a new location.

A site for the new airfield was found March 26. The 4.2 acres located on CR 1850N between Ind. 13 and CR 800W was so full of brush and trees that neighboring homes could not be seen. A lease was signed with landowner Sharline Webb and the work began.

Between the bouts of wet weather since March, the brush and trees were cleared and the ditches were cleaned. Randy Webb, Sharline's son, helped by plowing and working the ground. B & E Landscaping was contacted to finish working the ground and plant the grass seed.

Club members also pitched in to build the clubhouse and put up fences. Four months of hard work finally has paid off. Now the members have a place to call their own again. The grand opening of the new airfield was July 25.



Radio-controlled airplanes are operated by a fourchannel radio.

According to Jim Luurtsema, current president of the club and model airplane flier for 10 years, the new site is better, because it has fewer obstructions and is more wide open without any power lines.

Spectators at the airfield can see model aircraft from a small one that can run up to 100 mph to one of the more expensive aircraft owned by a member, which is worth about \$3,000 to \$4,000. The largest plane being flown at the airfield has a 10-foot wingspan.

Usually no more than three or four planes are flying at one time, but if that not enough, visitors are welcome to walk around and look at planes on the ground. Clubmembers fly several different categories

of planes, such as sport, scale aircraft, war planes, and racers to name a few. There's bound to be a plane to catch your interest.

Elwood's Bob Tolbert is another member of the Madison County R/C Flyers and is president of Chapter 48 (of Converse) of the International Miniature Aircraft Association, which consists only of one-quarter scale aircraft. Tolbert builds one plane a year during winter months and then enjoys flying them in the summer.

Memberships in the R/C Flyers and in the Academy of Model Aeronautics are required to fly at the airfield. The academy's headquarters is in Muncie.

Of course, an aircraft is needed, which, according to Luurtsema, can ost as much as one is willing to and. A beginner's plane with a 'um-sized engine, a radio and fuel will cost around \$400. "Plus you'll want to bring "at least one bottle of glue!" member Bill McGuire quips.

"There's nothing more exciting than a new guy with a new plane. Everyone stops what he's doing to help get him in the air," Luurtsema said. "Everyone wants to help the other guy."

Even children are encouraged to join in the fun. Luurtsema said children are the easiest to teach, because "they tend to have better eyesight and their hand and eye coordination is better."

Safety always is emphasized at the field, Luurtsema said. The chainlink fence that was put up is to keep spectators off the field and safe. A prop on a 0.5-cubic-inch engine on one of the planes turns 14,000 to 16,000 revolutions per minute, which could definitely cause injury.

If that's not reason enough to stay off the field, think of what fuels these planes. The fuel is a combination of alcohol, nitromethane and synthetic castor oil. Likewise 14 mechanical factors must work together for a plane to fly, and even then pilot error, or "dumb thumb," also must be considered.

In addition to all of the fun club members have in their spare time, the club also serves as host to two contests each year. A contest in the spring benefits a local charity. Proceeds from entry fees, giveaways and concession sales are always given to a local charity. The past three spring events netted a total of \$3,400, which was donated to Gateway Association of Anderson. The proceeds from the fail contest go to the club for upkeep of the grounds and other club activities. The date for this year's fall event has not been set.

The public always is we come to the airfield to enjoy the planes and talk with club members. The club currently has 65 members, down from 80 members last year. The youngest member this year is Travis Smith, 16, of Frankton, who has been flying for 3 to 4 years. The oldest member is Marion Perry, 74, of Anderson, who has been flying for 25 years. According to Luursema only two women pilots have ever joined the club.

It takes time and patience to learn to fly well, but the R/C Flyers,

good instructors and many nice people willing to lend a hand (or spare parts) with a fascinating hobby.






From Member Randy Thomas

Field Marshal:

With the hot weather and little rain we are not having to mow the airfield as much. The pit area and a landing area gets mowed once a week but the area to the east and west of the pit area and the roadside is being mowed every other week. The weeds along the creek banks were getting way to tall so Bill asked Kevin to bring his sickle bar mower to the field and give the Queen Anne's Lace a trim job which he did---Thank you Kevin!

Now a bit about our mowers. We are going to have to give some serious thought to replacing at least one this winter. I'm sure we can make it through this year with what we have but it is getting more and more difficult to keep the zero turn mower going. The newest mower, the Cub Cadet is running good and gives us very little problems. The little Allis runs pretty good but we need to check the oil level each mowing as it is using some oil and when you shut it off the engine winds down instead of stopping fast and that tells us that the compression is getting low. There is nothing much good to say about the zero turn. It has been problematic from day one. I don't know how many cables and belts we have put on it over the years but it is a bunch--and they are not easy to change. I finally welded some chains from the frame to the deck to relieve the tension on the cable that holds the deck up and that seems to have helped, as we have not had to replace a cable since. I don't want to give the impression that has a rough ride, but when you get home from mowing the first thing you do is put ice packs on your eyelids to reduce the swelling because it rides so rough that your eyelids are bruised from slamming shut because of the rough ride. Whoever is field marshal next year---and it won't be me---NEEDS a different large mower.

AMA members permitted to fly above 400 feet

There has been confusion among our members as to whether operations above 400 feet are permitted by the FAA. AMA has remained steadfast that operations above 400 feet are permitted, *if conducted within our safety program* requiring the pilot to be an AMA member, to avoid and not interfere with manned aircraft, and to keep the model within visual line of sight of the pilot/observer. In a recent letter to the AMA, the FAA recognized AMA's role as a community-based organization and acknowledged our safety guidelines, including allowing flight above 400 feet

Everyone has the right to be stupid. Some just abuse the privilege.
